Chief's Statement

2017 brought a 15% increase in calls for service over the prior year. The month of July, once again, proved to be the busiest "summer" month. You will notice that, beginning in October, the calls for service increased significantly as we changed the way we were reporting some of our calls for service. For example, officers are required to perform business/property checks during their tours of duty. This means that the officer(s) check each business/property by physically checking the doors/windows to ensure they're locked. In the past, some officers counted the Market Place as one business/property check even though they had physically checked each business. This change will represent a more accurate reflection of the calls for service each officer performs daily. Officers responded to an average of 1060 calls for service per month. The total number of motor vehicle accidents remained at almost the same level as last year. July was the highest month for traffic accidents with a total of 14 and January being the lowest with 0 traffic accidents. The highest traffic accident location was Duck Rd. with 34 and the time of day with the highest number of traffic accidents was between 1pm and 4pm with a total of 15 crashes. Reported crimes were very similar to last year, showing a slight decrease from 197 to 193. We had a 35% decrease in criminal arrests compared to last year. Traffic citations and warning citations also saw a decrease.

It is important to note that even though we saw some reductions in areas that included criminal arrests and traffic violation enforcement, we were also short two police officers for much of the year. One was out 6 months on medical leave and another had to resign and move back home to attend to his ailing mother. Even with the shortage of manpower through most of the summer months, officers continued to provide exceptional police services to both the residents and vacationing visitors. Officer Tracy Mann, who is our School Resource Officer, continues to interact with the students and staff daily, which includes teaching classes regarding anti-bullying and internet safety as well as being another resource for the teachers to utilize. Officer Mann spends countless hours of her own time assisting and participating in numerous after school programs throughout the school year. Officer Mann continues to teach DARE; several hundred children have successfully graduated from this class over the last two years. Patrol officers continue to visit and walk through the school on a daily basis. Officers also continue to be proactive by patrolling the neighborhoods and increasing their foot patrols which result in the officers getting out of the patrol cars more frequently and walking the business districts.

We continue to train and educate our officers; this year was no exception. We conducted several "Active Shooter" training segments at Kitty Hawk Elementary School that included joint training with Kitty Hawk Police Department, Duck Police Department and Southern Shores Volunteer Fire Department. We have also begun working with the new School Superintendent, and have addressed issues we had regarding Kitty Hawk Elementary School. The outcome of these meetings has been very positive.

I would like to personally thank all the members of the police department for the hard work and dedication each of them exhibits daily, and a special thanks to our Administrative Assistant Jennifer Couture for assisting in putting this report together. I would also like to thank the Town Manager for his sincere support and assistance as well as the Town Council and Community for their continued support.




















Motor Vehicle Accidents




2017 Accidents per Month

Master Patrol Officer Eddie McKeever was recognized at the September 5, 2017 Council meeting for receiving Traffic Enforcement & Investigation Certification. Certification requires 500 hours of classroom and is awarded by the N.C. Justice Academy. "This program is designed to recognize the achievement of law enforcement professionals who have dedicated themselves to making the highways safer for our citizens. Officers, upon completion of the program, will have mastered several important aspects of traffic enforcement and related topics, thus achieving a high level of professionalism for themselves as well as their department."



Patrol Officer Jamie Hines was also introduced at the September 5, 2017 Council meeting as the newest member of the Southern Shores Police Department. Officer Hines was born & raised in Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. He attended Manteo & First Flight High School, where he graduated in 2005. Officer Hines Graduated from COA Basic Law Enforcement Training Academy in 2012. He began his Law Enforcement career with the Town Kitty Hawk Police Department in 2013. Officer Hines was selected after an in-depth interview process that consisted of 15 potential candidates.

Senior Patrol Officer Ryan Jones was recognized at the October 3, 2017 Council meeting for receiving his Advanced Law Enforcement Certification. Professional certifications are awarded by North Carolina Training and Standards and are achieved through a combination of experience, education and training. Many officers spend their entire careers attempting to reach this goal. It is a testament to Officer Jones' education and training efforts that he was able to obtain his Advanced Certification so quickly.



At least twice a year, the Southern Shores Police Department conducts active shooter training at Kitty Hawk Elementary school.

This training is in response to unfortunate incidents occurring around the country and while we hope to never have to use this training, the Southern Shores Police Department will do everything possible to be prepared for the worst.





This training is occasionally conducted jointly with the Duck Police Department and the Kitty Hawk Police Department. These two departments will be there to assist us in the event of any critical incident so joint training is key for our separate agencies to work as a single entity.

Southern Shores hosted regional training for the West Point Leadership Program. The West Point Leadership Program is adapted from the Military Leadership Course (PL300) that all Cadets at the United States Military Academy complete in their third year of study.

The course has been adapted for use in non-military organizations. This is an academically rigorous course that relies heavily on the case study method of learning. The course examines and integrates leadership in organizations from four perspectives: the individual, the group, the leader, and the organization.



Southern Shores once again participated in the annual Shop with A Cop along with other agencies in Dare County and sponsored by the Sgt. Earl Murray Children's Christmas Fund. This yearly tradition is done in the seasonal spirit of giving to assist local families in need so that they can have a happy holiday.
